WHAT **ABOUT THE CHILDREN?** A report on the 2013 Children's Ministry Conference



What about the children? This question burns in the hearts of those who minister to children in the local church, and it became the catalyst for a gathering of 135 ministry leaders, volunteers, and parents on Saturday, October 26 at Westminster PC in Atlanta.

Representing 20 local churches from 14 states, these attendees explored ways to disciple effectively the covenant families in the Body of Christ. After a time of worship that included the children's choirs of Westminster, conference participants chose 3 of 22 workshops offered, along with a group discussion based on the different types of churches represented (e.g., small/ medium/large congregations). The goal of the day-long conference was

to provide opportunities for these leaders to connect with others who serve in similar ministries, and connect with some of the many resources available in the PCA. Seminars were led by practitioners from local churches and covered a variety of topics such as learning how to build relationships in the process of recruiting and training volunteers; helping parents maintain a

FIRST **IMPRESSIONS**

Your disposition can color not only your perspective, but others...



Occasionally, members of our family (including me) struggle with the "morning grumpies." Whatever the reason-disappointment, busyness, lack of sleep-that person sets a first impression that often colors the whole day and

negatively affects others.


First impressions. At this time of year, we remember when God made a "first impression" by taking on the nature of mankind. John's gospel doesn't have a Christmas story with shepherds and wise men; rather, he describes Christmas like this:

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14, ESV)

John's words hearken back to an earlier event in the life of Moses when he met with God on Mount Sinai. The people committed the great sin of the Golden Calf (Exodus 32). Moses went to the LORD to intercede for the wayward people. In his plea, Moses made a request: "Show me your glory" (Exodus 33:18). Moses had experienced God before, but he was asking for something different. Exodus 34:6-7 records what happened. The LORD passed before Moses and proclaimed His name:

"The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin, but who will by no means clear the guilty, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children and the children's children, to the third and fourth generation."

In the face of the great wickedness and brokenness of the people, God's "first impression" is mercy, grace, and steadfast love. He doesn't ignore the evil; instead, he

f you are interested in including more senior adults in children's ministry, you might want to have a conversation with Pat Chambless at First Presbyterian Church in Hattiesburg, MS. Pat and his wife Kay spent over twenty years volunteering within youth ministry, but after the addition of their grandson to the family, Pat decided to teach the fourand five-year-old Sunday school class. Pat has a love for sharing Jesus with children, and he doesn't mind squirmy, talkative, or apprehensive little ones. In fact, he is a gifted teacher of all ages, but particularly

young children. However, due to work and family constraints, Pat Chambless had to take a break from teaching for quite a while.

Then came a retirement announcement. After more than thirty six years in the banking profession, Pat's work was honored and celebrated as he prepared to leave his occupation. If you were the children's ministry director and you knew this man would have some extra time on his hands, what would you do? It seemed appropriate to glean some of that new freedom and years of experience. Right after he cleaned out his desk, he put on his shorts and t-shirt and joined the Vacation Bible School (VBS) team as a teacher of four-year-olds. Every child wanted to sit in Mr. Pat's lap, hold his hand, and tell him their Bible verses. He was such a blessing to the whole week, showing genuine

interest in each student, caring for them, teaching them, and loving them with Jesus' love.

The really wonderful thing is that the VBS experience was a joy to Pat as well. He decided to come back the following yearespecially after his co-teacher requested to be paired with him once more. After this second time, when asked to help recruit new volunteers for Vacation Bible School, this is what he had to share, "Being one of the older members of the church now, I don't have as much contact with the youth or their parents as I used to have. Volunteering for VBS has allowed me to meet and get to know some of the parents and work with some of our precious children. This spring, Grace Covenant PCA of Williamsburg, VA brought

together 83 men, ranging from teenagers to college students to graduate students to single thirtysomethings to fathers and grandfathers, for a three-hour Saturday morning seminar on **Rediscover**-

ing Biblical Manhood. The seminar, conducted by PCA Men's Ministry Coach Gary Yagel, was what one participant called "a great opportunity for males of all ages to get a perspective on masculinity in our cur-

rent culture." Beginning with Genesis 2, the men compared what American culture is saying about masculinity with the mandate God gave Adam to live in the

garden to "work it" and "keep it."

Other sessions included a panel of Grace Covenant members discussing **In the Dance with Woman What Does Authentic Manhood Look Like?** Later in the morning, fathers and grandfathers were particularly challenged to consider **What a Son Needs to Grow into Authentic Manhood**. After lunch, the seminar closed with a look at **Jesus: God's Portrait of Manhood**.

Over the lunch break, Gary met with the Grace Covenant Men's Ministry Leadership Team to give suggestions and



encouragement that was tailored to the unique needs of the congregation.

The impact of the seminar has been multi-faceted. The leadership is already planning a future event to discuss the topics raised in their time together. One

> elder reported that a participant picked up a copy of the book, **Intimacy: God's Design for Marriage**, and was working to apply the principles in his

marriage, to include a long-overdue date with his wife. In reflecting on the day, one man commented, *"The material in this seminar meets a vital need in the church."*

We praise God for his blessing on the seminar and especially for the daily efforts of the leaders who are on the front lines of men's ministry. Women's Leadership 2014 Training Conference



One of the valuable resources available to women in the PCA is found in the seven trainers who serve the Women's Ministry Team (see them at **pcacep.org/women**). The annual Women's Leadership Training Conference (LT) has been a great opportunity for PCA women to meet and

learn from these trainers through seminars, as well as informal conversation. Many times, conversations turn into invitations for the trainer to visit a local congregation for a ministry event.

At the 2013 conference, one local church made the investment of bringing most of their young leadership team. The congregation had begun a strategic local ministry, using resources available through CEP. The relationships developed as they studied these resources and led to the group registering for LT. One woman reflected on her experience:

"The weekend in Atlanta was full of grace and inspired us in many ways to serve with humility. We feel safe knowing that we are under such a biblical umbrella in our denomination. Thank you for **helping** us and *showing* us how to serve King Jesus and His people."

As a result of their experience, this local church offered the twelve churches of their presbytery a fall training weekend with one of CEP's trainers. The event brought together 150 women – 25 of them high school teens – who learned more of what it means to be a disciple in God's kingdom.

The 2014 LT promises to be another great opportunity to learn not only from the trainers of the PCA Women's Ministry Team, but also from other women who serve as leaders in the denomination. Giving to Meet **the Need**



Every holiday season, people struggle with the question, "How can I give so that a ministry is blessed and my gift actually addresses the need?" For the dis-

cipleship ministry of the PCA, there are a number of ways that churches and individuals give.

The "ministry ask" is the amount per member that CEP requests from churches that donate. This figure takes into account that, for a variety of reasons, not all PCA congregations are able to donate to General

Assembly causes. In 2013, the CEP "ministry ask" is \$7 per church member.

An alternate method is the "per capita calculation." This amount optimistically assumes that every PCA church will give to the work of the General Assembly regardless of the circumstances of the congregation. In 2013, the CEP "per capita

calculation" is \$2.54 per church member.
